Have you heard of "Stop the Bleed"? How about "Bleeding Control"?

Recent mass casualty incidents in the U.S. have shown that the key to survival for many victims with traumatic injuries is immediate bleeding control provided by first responders or private citizens.

The American College of Surgeons Committee on Trauma is leading the efforts to save lives by teaching everyone how to provide vital initial response to stop uncontrolled bleeding in emergency situations. Uncontrolled bleeding is the number one cause of preventable death from trauma, so the greater the number of people who know how to control bleeding in an injured patient, the greater the chances of surviving that injury.
